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Biography

Adj Asst Prof Chan received her PhD (Health Sciences) from the University of Sydney, Australia in 2014. She was the first nurse in Singapore to be sponsored for a Master of Science (Health Research Methodology) at the McMaster University, Canada, and she also holds a Master of Nursing Studies from the Queensland University of Technology, Australia. Ee Yuee has pioneered impactful research and her work has led to more than 40 peer-reviewed publications. During the Covid-19 period, Ee Yuee launched Project Carer Matters, Singapore's first nurse-led hospital-to-home framework of care to support patient-caregiver dyads at home – it has since supported over 700 families. She is currently leading a team to strengthen the caregiving ecosystem through Project Carer Matters 2, supported by MOH's National Innovation Challenge. Committed to advancing nursing research, she established TTSH's hybrid Nurse Clinician-Scientist career track to groom the next generation.
